Cats are the most popular pet in the world, but they didn't always hold that title. In China around 500 B.C. it was illegal for anyone other than the emperor to own a cat. In the 1400s, the Catholic Church officially denounced cats, because people believed cats were connected to witches. A lot of famous people throughout history have loved cats. Leonardo da Vinci painted the smiling Mona Lisa, but he also loved drawing cats and said they were a "masterpiece" in the world of nature. The mimic octopus is one of the only animals in the world that is that smart and it's definitely the fastest at putting on its disguises!

BLACK BEAR: Bears may not take that many showers, but they smell great! Actually, in the animal kingdom, they have the most powerful noses of all. Bears can smell things from over 20 miles away. Their sense of smell is seven times better than a bloodhound's and over 2,000 times stronger than a human's! If detectives were really smart, they'd use bears instead of dogs to sniff out clues...um...or maybe they made the right decision.





MOST OBSERVANT:

JUMPING SPIDER: They get their name from their ability to jump over 40 times their body length, but it's their eyes, all EIGHT of 'em, that make jumping spiders awesome detectives! Jumping spiders have four sets of eyes, and each set works like a fancy spy camera: one set for seeing things far away, one set for sensing movement on their sides, one set that can measure distances, and even a set that has special night vision. Ooooh.

BIGGEST SMARTY-PANTS (NOT TO BE CONFUSED WITH SMARTY SASSPANTS)

Some scientists say CHIMPANZEES are the smartest, and others say DOLPHINS. Both are great at puzzles, learn spoken commands, and love playing games and sports.
