These..."]: sure, I could go on at length about
Tim DeHaas's story, the smiles at his excellent
grasp of Londo and G'Kar and their rivalry, my
satisfaction at his ability with so many of the
rest of the ensemble and a well-written story
(most important of all!), and my pleasant
surprise that Joe [Straczynski] let someone
else play with his Shadowmen. Others enjoy
expressing themselves that way, and they do it
better than I. My only critical comment on the
story would be that I hope it isn't going to be
just a chase/survival tale, because Garibaldi
and Keffer obviously will survive, so there's no
suspense in that.

John Ridgway has been a favorite artist of mine for a few years now, so I wasn't all that surprised to find his art a big improvement over Michael Netzer's and Carlos Garzon's. John made a much better attempt at capturing the look, feel, and details of B5. I'd welcome John's return for another story arc. Also, Scott Hampton did an excellent cover! I wish he would stay on as permanent cover artist.

Why the price hike and slick paper?
Unless DC will upgrade to full process computer color (which, considering the major source of B5's effects, would be quite appropriate), this price and format change are an undeserved and unfair picking of the fans' pockets.

Suggestions (as if I haven't already given you enough lip, but you asked): Joe has mentioned on the Net that John Ostrander, Peter David, Bill Mumy, and Neil Gaiman might write upcoming arcs. I hope so, too, but some of my dream writer/artist teams would be: John Byrne writing and inking, with Curt Swan pencilling (Psi-Corps/political intrigues at Earth Dome, maybe?); Archie Goodwin and Al

Williamson (possibly Starfuries against new Raiders with exotic technology); John Arcudi and Bob McLeod (maybe one of Catherine Sakai's space surveys was hardly routine?); and Walt Simonson and Gil Kane (an undercover walk on the wild side among the non-aligned worlds?).

I'm hopin' and a-prayin'... but I'm not holding my breath. But if you don't ask, you can't receive, so please give those talents a call, Puh-lease!

Congratulations on the conclusion of your first story arc [issue #4, "The Price of Peace"]. What can I say, I am impressed. You have pulled off a pretty good first attempt at bringing a television series to the print medium.

However, as with many other "Bab-Nuts,"
I tend to pick nits rather than give credit where credit is due. Remember, we do this because we (like you, I'm sure) love BABYLON 5 and want this to be the best possible comic you can give readers. (Sorry if I dwell too much on the "little mistakes.")

Mr. Moretti: Great having the Psi-Corps setting up the Homeguard. I honestly thought it would be Bester trying to take a parting shot at Sinclair after the events of "Mind War" and would tie into the assassination of the President.

Unfortunately, a continuity error cropped up when Delenn, Neroon, and the Judiciaries discuss the human/Minbari souls issue. Neroon did not know the reason until he replaced Delenn on the Grey Council ([TV episode:] "All Alone in the Night"). For that matter, only the Grey Council should know about this.

Mr. Netzer: Great improvement since issue one (or two, for that matter). You are a talented man but have a problem with little details. Garibaldi and Sheridan wear armor (which, by the way, looks nothing like the series' armor) and then it mysteriously disappears two pages later. Insignias are the biggest problem; some appear and disappear randomly, and sometimes, spontaneously change position on uniforms.

Mr. Busch: my pet peeve, what drives me bonkers is the fact that security uniforms are GREY, not BLUE. Without seeming hostile over such a little thing as the coloring of a comic book page, I must ask: have you seen the show? Please take more care in the future.

With many licensed projects, I feel creators believe they don't have to be careful, because they think fans may complain but they'll always keep buying. Please don't go in this direction. Babylon 5 is special, from the people behind it to the finished product. The comic should follow this tradition and be a testament to the series, not just a siphon for cash flow.

Sorry if I seem too harsh, but you're doing a good job. I just think you're capable of a great one.

How about a storyline focusing mostly on the alien characters? A story featuring Londo and G'Kar could be fun.

Anyway, keep up the great work. Can't wait to see what happens to Garibaldi and Keffer in #6.
